Brown Act Reminder: The League of California Cities Board of Directors has a policy of complying with the spirit of open meeting laws. Generally, off-agenda items may be taken up only if: Two-thirds of the division members find that a need for immediate action exists and that the need to take action came to the attention of the division after the agenda was prepared. (Note: If less than two-thirds of the division members are present, taking up an off-agenda item requires a unanimous vote); or a majority of the division finds an emergency exist, e.g., work stoppage or disaster. A majority of a city council may not, according to the Brown Act, discuss specific substantive issues among themselves at League meetings. Any such discussion is subject to the Brown Act and must occur in a meeting, which complies with its requirements.
